# Getting to know Chilliwack's Species at Risk

Species at risk profile: Oregon Forestsnail, Allogona townsendiana

### What it looks like:

A large land snail (23-30 mm) with a brown or yellow-brown shell that sometimes looks bleached. The underside has a deep central pit and a thick, white and flared lip. Click here for more identification details.

## Where it lives:

Lives in moist low elevation forests, often associated with bigleaf maple trees and patches of stinging nettle. <u>Visit this map for location details.</u>

#### What it eats:

It consumes forest plants with a preference for stinging nettle.

## What are its main threats in the Fraser Valley?

Habitat loss through development.

# Did you know?

- While they are still locally abundant in the Fraser Valley, this is one of the few places they exist in Canada.
- Snails are most active when the ground is moist, and temperatures are moderate (spring and fall).
- Stinging nettle a favorite food as it has high levels of calcium and other essential minerals which are important for healthy shells.
